100 Years Bauhaus: Discover and Experience the Making of Modern 0.25 credits

The Bauhaus was an art school founded in 1919 in the city of Weimar, Germany by German architect Walter Gropius. Its core objective was a radical concept: to reimagine the material world of war-torn Europe to reflect the unity of all the arts and of all world cultures. In the fifteen years of its existence the Bauhaus would undergo many changes, including moves from Weimar to Dessau and from Dessau to Berlin, as well as a reorientation away from craft and towards industrial production. Nevertheless, its core principles persisted: a coordination of fine with applied arts and of form with function; a commitment to de-hierarchized, experimental learning in the form of workshops; and the desire to disseminate advanced aesthetics among a broad population. Attracting men and women from Europe, the Americas, and East Asia, the Bauhaus adopted an international and gender-inclusive orientation from the beginning. After the school's forced closure in 1933 by the National Socialists, many of its teachers and students left Germany to found art schools throughout the globe, and its core principles continue to shape art pedagogy and practice today.

Funded by a grant from the German Embassy, this seminar brings together a number of speakers from Wesleyan and neighboring institutions to reflect on the Bauhaus's contributions to a diversity of artistic media, including architecture, the applied arts, cinema, and prints. Students are required to attend ALL seven events, including an introduction and final meeting. There are no costs to the students.
